Our theme for the year is "Finding Our Purpose," and we started strong with a session about glorifying God. Throughout the year we are hoping to look at subjects such as pride, relationships, identity and many more! It's exciting to see the energy and excitement in the youth to learn more and deepen their relationship with God.

Many of the youth came to the youth group through a program called "Alpha," last year. Since then, many of them have been baptized and started coming to Sunday services as well. Although we have 30 to 50 youth, many don't have the basis of what it means to be a Christian, or what it looks like to live a Christian life. Our goal is to teach the love of Jesus, and at the same time, speak truth into the lives of everyone who comes, in a way that is easy to understand, and eventually go deeper once the foundation is made.

In the first week of February we received an email that my documents for my U.S. visa got approved! We are very excited to know that we are a step ahead in this process, and hope that soon we will be able to travel together to the U.S.. If all the next steps go smoothly there's a possibility that we'd be able to travel this year! We then visited an old hospital and psych ward called "Duran Sanatorium," which was used for tuberculosis patients during a pandemic in the early 1900s. It was then turned into a historical site, and brings a lot of tourists. It was a full day of great experiences, including having a picnic in our cars because the wind was so strong our plates would've blown away. The family who was with us has been a huge blessing for us and we've created a great relationship with each one of them. It was a three hour drive each way, but so worth it! We enjoyed every moment!

One of our friends, whose nickname is 'Pollo' which means chicken, invited us to visit him and go to a river by his house. He lives in a secluded town in the mountain off the main road. Most of his family are farmers of all kinds; cows, milk and cheese, chickens, a little bit of everything. The river was beautiful, and right on the edge of where white-water rafting tours are done. The trail to the river was long, and the hike back up the mountain was tiresome, but definitely worth it, although I'm not sure we would do it again, haha.
